

Three Elephants — Disruptive Forces

 1. China's dual role — Trade partner and threat to economic security. Non-EU hardware/software dependencies external pressures that can risk digital sovereignty and expose vulnerabilities in critical systems. China's "Belt and Road" initiative is expanding worldwide and increasing Chinese investment and leverage in ports. China is "hoovering" up data.





Three Elephants – Disruptive Forces

 2. Russia opting for aggressive strategies to destabilize the West. Escalation of hybrid threats, cyberattacks and sabotage activities. Russian hackers attempting to sabotage operations on the computers of public institutions. Russian surveillance ships systematically sail through the western maritime region





Three Elephants – Disruptive Forces

 USA tariff reforms in 2025 caused major changes in freight markets. Increased costs, extended customs clearance and supply chain bottlenecks. Latter can lead to measures from other countries and further escalating international trade tension and disrupting global chains. Recent information about increase in port fees by the US Customs and Border Protection is another example.





The EU as the Porcelain Shop

Together, these elephants illustrate the scale and weight of today's geopolitical challenges.

The European Union, and perhaps also other continents/countries, represents the porcelain shop — a space of shared prosperity and delicate interdependence.

Yet, it faces growing risks from external shocks, technological dependencies, and hybrid threats that could threaten stability.
